Budget Vote

Registered voters residing in the Clarkstown Central School District may vote on the combined New City/ West Nyack Library proposed fiscal-year-2020 budget. If you have not voted in an annual or special election in the last four calendar years, please register at the District Clerk's office weekdays from 8:30 AM until 3:30 PM through Dec. 5. Call 639-6455 for further registration information.

The annual budget referendum being put forth by the New City Library Board has a proposed 2 percent tax levy increase. This modest increase reflects our commitment to controlling spending while still offering superior library service.

The budget hearing will be at the West Nyack Library on Tuesday, Nov. 20, at 7 PM.

Trustee Election

Three positions on our nine-member board are open. Registered voters residing in the service area of the library are eligible to vote. Candidates' information is available at the library or on our website. The trustee election is held in a room separate from the budget vote.



RECOVERING HENRY VARNUM POOR

Environmental educator Chuck Stead examines the work and life of renowned American artist Henry Varnum Poor, who built a stone-and-wood farmhouse (Crow House) off South Mountain Road to nurture his art and raise his family. Poor (1887-1970) was a successful architect, painter, sculptor, muralist, and potter, as well as an author.


