Become a Library Trustee!

Give back to your community and library by running for a position on the library board. A trustee is responsible for ensuring that the library provides the best possible service to its community. To be eligible, a candidate must live within the service area, be at least 18 years old, possess a library card in good standing for 180 days prior to the election and may not be an employee or the immediate family member of an employee of the library. Trustee applications are available at all the public service desks or can be downloaded from our website beginning Monday, Aug. 23.

Renovation: The Library You Deserve

Years of planning will be put into motion now that we have completed the design development phase of the New City Library renovation. Your participation in strategic planning surveys and master-plan focus groups, as well as your continual communication with staff, have informed the design of a modern library that I believe will satisfy (dare I say thrill) both patrons and staff.

At the time of this writing, the library is close to securing a temporary location that will be used to serve our patrons on a smaller scale during construction. The library board and administration left no option unexamined when it came to deciding how we would continue to serve our community during what will certainly be a disruptive period. Phasing the construction while continuing to operate out of the facility would be too expensive and a logistical challenge that would unnecessarily extend the inconvenience. The Town of Clarkstown graciously offered the school building at Rockland Country Day School as a possible site, but the technological and physical alterations required would have been an inefficient use of our resources. It was decided that a retail space will offer the best compromise in terms of cost and effort.

In the temporary location, we anticipate offering, at the minimum, materials pickup. Once we secure the location, we will endeavor to offer more services as the space allows. However, we can and will certainly offer programs at various locations throughout the town, as well as online as we currently do.

The timeline of the project remains somewhat undetermined because of factors affecting it, such as permitting and the completion of construction documents. Demolition should begin in March 2022, which means we will aim to be set up in our temporary location earlier in the year. The construction period itself has been estimated at 12 months.

We acknowledge the inevitable upheaval this will cause within our community. But true to our mission, we are making these improvements so that your ability to connect with people, information and ideas through the library can also improve the quality of your life. If you would like to support us in this mission, please consider donating to our Renovation Fund at tinyurl.com/newcityreno. The project itself will be covered by capital funds and financing within our operating budget, as well as construction grants. However, the Renovation Fund can help us fully realize the vision of a modern library for our community by giving us the means to invest in the details and purchase the little extras that will enhance the overall outcome.

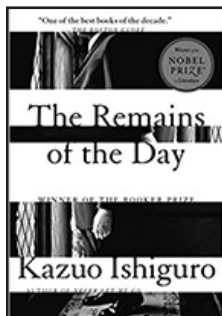

ONE TOWN, ONE BOOK 2021



Starting Thursday, Sept. 9, the library will give out free copies of this year's **One Town, One Book** selection: *The Remains of the Day* by Kazuo Ishiguro.

In this book, the protagonist Mr. Stevens begins working as Lord Darlington's butler in the 1930s. His identity as a dignified English butler is the sole foundation on which he builds his life. When the lord dies two decades later, Stevens finally begins to question his loyalty to the man and the class structure he represented. He also must come to terms with the love he sacrificed in the name of dignity. This 1989 novel by the Nobel Prize-winning British author Kazuo Ishiguro was the winner of the Booker Prize for Fiction.

View the film (nominated for eight Academy Awards and five Golden Globes) and compare it to the book.

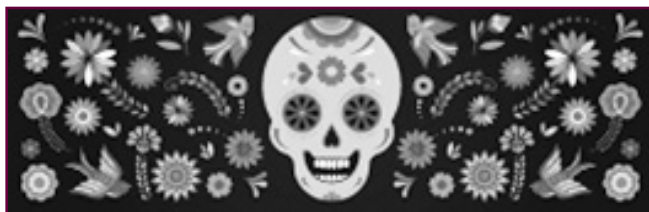
